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

From Pastor Ruth ...

Dear Church Family and Friends,

It's 9 PM. I have ashes in a sign of the cross on my forehead signifying my identification as a follower of Jesus. I just sat down at my desk in my church office after putting things away following our beautiful Ash Wednesday service held this evening in which, following a delicious meal of soup and bread, we collectively moved into the season of Lent. Chalices now washed and put away, the bowls filled with the ashes emptied, everyone's Lenten vows placed in a sealed envelope that will be burned with this year's palms to create next year's ashes, and, with the beautiful faces and music of our service still lingering in my soul, I finally have a moment alone to prepare myself inwardly for the Lenten journey to the Cross, during which I hope to be able to offer you opportunities for spiritual growth. In addition to other events, these will include a Lenten Sermon Series and a Spring Spiritual Retreat. Since on Maundy (Commandment) Thursday of Holy Week, we will remember Jesus' new commandment to us 'to love one another, as Jesus has loved us,' this year's Lenten sermon series will take its inspiration from Gary Chapman's book The Five Love Languages.



On Sundays during Lent, we will look at scriptures that relate to the love languages of words of affirmation, quality time, receiving gifts, acts of service, and physical touch. I also already am busy preparing a day-long Spring Spiritual Retreat to be held on Saturday, March 28, at Camp Kum-Ba-Ya on a topic that long has been of great interest to me: Celtic Christian Spirituality. I am discovering that my own spiritual DNA resonates so deeply with its teachings and practices.

As part of my preparation for it, I am planning on experimenting with a number of Celtic Lenten practices suggested by Joyce Rupp in her old but still relevant article "Celtic crossovers: May the Lent of the Irish be with you," which, should you be interested, may be found by going to the following link:

I close this article by sending you Lenten blessings and leaving you with the following words from a great Celtic hymn:

"Celtic Christian Spirituality"

Many are drawn to the creation-affirming wisdom, spiritual teachings, and practices of the Celtic way. Nurtured in parts of Wales, Britain, Ireland, and Scotland, this rich tradition combines elements from the mythology and folklore of the pre-Christian Celts with a form of Christianity that took root in the early centuries through the efforts of people such as St. Ninian and St. Patrick, which expressed itself through poetry, legends, and the lives of the saints. Contemporary teachers such as John Philip Newell, John O'Donohue, Carl McColman, and Paul John Martin have helped revitalize Celtic Christianity with people going on pilgrimage to Iona and Lindisfarne and affiliating with groups such as the "Community of Aidan and Hilda." Since, however, there is no one uniting authoritative text, teacher, or tradition, the umbrella of Celtic Christian Spirituality is large and cannot easily be defined. Yet there are common threads: a spirituality that is more poetic than doctrinal, an understanding of God in Trinity who offers divine presence and protection, communities that stress hospitality and following a way of life, the experience of soul friends, pilgrimage, a reverence for the goodness of creation, along with an understanding of thin places, sacred spaces, sacred symbols, numbers, and animals. Our retreat will be partly structured around the legacy of a number of Celtic saints: Patrick of Armagh, Brigid of Kildare, Brendan of Clonfert, Non of Wales, David of Wales, Ita of Killeedy, Aiden of Lindisfarne, and Hilda of Whitby. We will enjoy listening to Celtic music and hymns, as we incorporate Celtic blessings, prayers and liturgies, and learn about unique forms of Celtic religious art such as the Celtic knot and high standing crosses. Come and allow your souls to be refreshed by the beauty of nature, and nourished by the wisdom we can gain by learning about Celtic Christian Spirituality, as we are strengthened and renewed by a day away from the stresses of our everyday lives!



The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards was established in 1987 as the teaching profession's vehicle for defining and recognizing accomplished teaching. National Board Certification, which is built upon National Board Standards and the National Board's Five Core Propositions, is the profession's mark of accomplished teaching. To date, more than 112,000 teachers in all 50 states and the District of Columbia have achieved National Board Certification. With 4,007 NBCTs, Kentucky ranks 6th in the nation for the percentage of teachers who are Board-certified (9.53%) and 8th in the nation for the total number of Boardcertified teachers.

Gratitude: A Communion Message

As Pastor Ruth mentioned (in January), our denomination has chosen to make mental health a topic of focus. Many times when we mention "mental health", we might first think of issues concerning mental illnesses: depression, anxiety, substance abuse, addiction; even topics like Alzheimer's and dementia. But what about mental WELLNESS? What does it mean to be mentally well? How, or CAN we even, improve our own mental wellness?

Over the course of the past year, several recurring themes have crossed my newsfeed that have to do with the concept of Gratitude. While each article took its own spin on what gratitude might mean or feel like to a person, each had a similar vein: Gratitude is one of the most common traits of a person who is at peace, who is mentally well, and while we cannot control all of the factors in our lives, we can actively work to cultivate gratitude. And this is important because the emotion of gratitude generates a climate of positivity that reaches both inward, creating internal peace, and outward spreading peace to others. It fosters both physical and psychological health, even among those already struggling with mental health issues. The expression of gratitude can repress negative emotion cycles and in brain scans actually show lasting changes in the prefrontal cortex region of the brain responsible for future experiences of gratitude. The intentional task of feeling grateful literally helps you feel more grateful in the future.

What better place for us as Christians than to start, or continue, an intentional mindset of gratitude than at this very table. Let us take a brief moment to perhaps close our eyes and count, on our hands, thinking of five things for which we can thank our Heavenly Father. Our families, our church, our health, our jobs, all of our blessings we can thank Him for. Let us begin our new year with an intentional mindset of gratitude, so that we may feel peace within ourselves and exude peace to others.

First Christian Church's Favorite Recipes

Mashed Potato Casserole

Ingredients: Instant potatoes for 12 8 oz. cream cheese Cheddar cheese

1 cup sour cream garlic salt



Directions:

Prepare potatoes according to package directions. Add remaining ingredients. Place in 9 x 13 casserole dishes. Top with butter pats. Bake at 350 degrees until heated through (about 30 minutes). Sprinkle shredded cheddar cheese on top (enough cheese to cover the top of the casseroles—about 3/4 cup) after 25 minutes of baking.

Strawberry Congealed Salad

2 small boxes of strawberry Jell-0

2 cups boiling water

Mix together and cool.

Add 1 #2 (16 oz.) can crushed pineapple with juice and 1 can strawberry pie filling. Refrigerate until Jell-O is set.

For the topping, combine 1 cup sour cream, 1 tsp. vanilla extract and 2 Tablespoons confectioners sugar OR Cool Whip.





In March, we will discuss chapter six ("If It Is True, It Is True Everywhere") of Richard Rohr's *Immortal Diamond: The Search for Our True Self* (Jossey-Bass, 2013), which has been reviewed as follows:.

How well do we know ourselves? So many roles and identities shape individual lives that it's easy to be confused about what is authentically "us." Rohr, a Franciscan priest and founding director of the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque, New Mexico, leads a narrative excursion to the "True Self," the core of character that lies like a diamond buried within. Writing for secular seekers, the author claims that individuals need to allow the false self to fall away in order to get in touch with the true self, allowing it to breathe and flourish. Grasping onto the superficial identities of the false self, such as job, class, race, or accomplishments, can keep people from being the loving and generous conduits of the Divine that they are meant to be. God is always communicating with humans, but those who cling to ego and social position can't hear these divine messages. The author makes clear that it is not easy to shed this falseness for truth in the inner life, but it is a spiritual path well worth the effort.—*Publishers Weekly*, February 2013.

Faith and Film

Thursday, March 12, 6 p.m. Viewing of *"Ben Is Back" (2018)* Directed by Peter H. Hedges (Drama about a mother's determination to keep her opioid addicted son in recovery) Followed by discussion over snacks

"According to the U.S. Health and Human Services Department, 47,600 people died from overdoses of opioid pain relievers, both prescription and non-prescription, in 2017. Some 2.1 million people had an opioid use disorder or addiction. As the opioid crisis expands, clinics and hospitals are barely able to keep up with the demand for care and services. Families are being torn apart as they try to deal with the effects of addiction. For the addict, recovery can be a long and lonely battle where even the most precious and persistent kind of love can match the power of the drugs. Two 2018 films focus on families dealing with addicted teens. In *Beautiful Boy* [seen in Faith and Film in February], Timothee Chalamet plays a young crystal meth addict, and Steve Carrell is his idealistic father David who is willing to do whatever it takes to retrieve his son from the prison of addiction. In *Ben Is Back*, Lukas Hedges plays a young man in recovery from addiction to pain killers prescribed when he had an injury as a young teen; since then he has used opioids extensively and been a dealer in his small town. Julia Roberts ... is his mother who is determined to support his recovery. ... When Ben comes home from rehab unexpectedly for Christmas, his mother Holly is delighted that the family can be together for the holiday. ... The whole family enters into an uneasy dance, alternating between loving moments and questions about whether Ben is lying and up to his old tricks. ... It is heartwarming and also heartbreaking to watch the parents in *Beautiful Boy* and *Ben Is Back* dealing with their sons' addictions. They try all the obvious approaches and then end up going down different paths. They learn more about what their sons' are going through, but what they really learn is their own capacities for care and compassion." ~ Review by Frederic and Mary Ann Brussat in "Spirituality and Practice"

Thursday, April 30, 6 p.m. Viewing of *"A Beautiful Mind" (2001)* Directed by Ron Howard

(The incredible story of a brilliant Nobel Prize-winning mathematician whose wife helps him hatch his heart during a protracted struggle with schizophrenia.) Followed by discussion over snacks


"In 1947, John Forbes Nash, Jr., (Russell Crowe) arrives at Princeton for graduate study in mathematics on a scholarship. ... It is by chance that Nash stumbles upon a game theory that challenges the essential premises of Adam Smith, the father of modern economics. His advisor at Princeton, Professor Helinger (Judd Hirsch) hails this discovery as a major breakthrough. Nash lands a prestigious post at a top defense laboratory at MIT. ... The Cold War is sending waves of fear and paranoia across the country when Nash is called upon to do some code-breaking work for the Pentagon. ... Meanwhile, on a much more mundane level, the math whiz teaches classes at MIT. Alicia (Jennifer Connelly), an attractive and smart student, seems interested in him. ... They eventually marry. But their relationship is rocked when Alicia discovers that Nash suffers from paranoid schizophrenia and several of the most important people in his life are actually hallucinations of his mind. ... Alicia, however, refuses to give up on him. While her husband undergoes electroshock therapy and heavy doses of medication, she courageously stands by her man. At one point when Nash reveals his anguish at not being able to tell the difference between what is real and what is not, his wife puts her hand on his face and his hand on her heart, saying "This is what is real." But the strain of living with a schizophrenic nearly exhausts her physical and emotional reserves. Nash struggles for years to keep his equilibrium despite his illness. Finally, he returns to Princeton where Hansen (Josh Lucas), his old rival from years ago, first allows him to use the library and eventually gives him a teaching position. In 1994, the mathematics genius is awarded a Nobel Prize for his game theory. Of course, by then, he has realized the truth of Helen Keller's observation: "The best and most beautiful things in the world cannot be seen or even touched; they must be felt in the heart." A Beautiful Mind received four Academy Awards including Best Picture of 2001, Best Director, Best Supporting Actress for Jennifer Connelly, and Best Adapted Screenplay for Akiva Goldsman." ~ Review by Frederic and Mary Ann Brussat in "Spirituality and Practice"
