The Christian Women's Fellowship has finalized plans for their Bake Sale and Soup and Cornbread Luncheon to be held Saturday, November 6th. Pastor's Article

Dear Church Family and Friends,

While our weekly "Tuesday Email" has been going out faithfully over the past few months, the last edition of *Church Life* was published at the end of last April (the May/June/July edition) as one of the last things that our Director of Communications, Debbie Batteiger, did before leaving on May 20 to assume a position as a journalist. We remember that she ended up leaving a week earlier than initially planned as she rushed to her mother's beside to be with her when she took her final breath, dying from Covid-19, even though she had been vaccinated.



Our initial search for a new administrative assistant was not successful as no good match was found. This position requires someone not just with a good skill-set but also someone of outstanding character with excellent communication skills. We were so fortunate that my friend Angela Thomas (wife of our recently deceased congregant Steve Horwood) helped us make contact with an enormously gifted young woman named Katelyn Crane, who began working at the church on July 20th. She will introduce herself to you following my article. I know that you will enjoy working with her. So as not to overload Katelyn as she had to learn to do so many new things with initially limited hours (about to be extended), we decided to hold off on publishing *Church Life* until now, even though this meant a long gap between issues.

During the period of time between Debbie and Katelyn, when Judy Lyle and I were overseeing the office, I reflected on the evolution of *Church Life* under my watch. When I first arrived back in February of 2009, *Church Life* came out biweekly. It was a cumbersome task as everything was typed out, clip art manually added, run off on the photocopy machine (there were usually 3 or 4 pages), folded, mailing labels put on, then the mail was sorted into categories based on mailing addresses, and brought to the post office where it was snail mailed out to over 100 households at the bulk mail rate.

About a year or so later, Steve Parker, who worked at Printing Supplies over on 4th Street, mentioned to us that they could do an attractive mailing for us that would look highly professional. We decided to give it a try. For a few years we emailed articles and photos to them, which their graphic artist turned into a beautiful slick glossy publication. This made our lives so much easier. However, it was very expensive since postage costs still needed to be added to that. Margaret Heath, our administrative assistant at that time, next came up with the idea that she wanted to try to produce *Church Life* using the Microsoft Publisher program on her computer. She did an outstanding job of creating an attractive and informative version of *Church Life*, which she then ran off on the copy machine and snail mailed out at a bulk mail rate.

When Amanda Pennington arrived as our administrative assistant, her goal was to help us streamline things and save money. She wondered why, since so many people were on the internet, we weren't emailing *Church Life* out to everyone who had email addresses, leaving out paper copies for those who weren't on email but were at church on Sundays or weekdays, and only snail mailing it out to those who did not have email and were not at church (the homebound and those who did not live in Murray). During her tenure with us she used her knowledge of graphic design to give *Church*

Life a facelift with a view to it being primarily an online publication. Needless to say, our postage costs went way down since most people could receive a version via email. Additionally, instead of it being a bi-weekly publication, we began to produce it ten times a year (with November / December being a single volume). To stay connected to the congregation between issues of *Church Life*, we created a weekly email that included the upcoming events, joys, concerns, giving information etc., which we started calling the "Tuesday Email" since it covered from that week's Tuesday until the following week's Monday.

When Debbie Batteiger took over, assuming the title of "Director of Communications," with the goal of increasing the communication not only within the congregation but also outside the church, she correctly believed it was important to prioritize the weekly "Tuesday Email" over *Church Life*. She upgraded what we could do with it by moving from sending it out with the church's Gmail to using a program called Mailchimp. This allowed her to include photos and even videos and also apps that led the readers directly to our website(www.fccmurray.com) and our church's Facebook and Instagram pages.

While *Church Life* still was important, the decision was made to publish it six rather than ten times a year. Since Debbie loved photos, *Church Life* began to include a more substantial photographic look back at previous events while advertising upcoming events. The last few editions of *Church Life* under Debbie's watch also included a number of Faith Journeys given by members of the congregation during this Covid period of time.

And now, with this issue, Katelyn is taking the helm of this publication, which has such a longstanding history and has played such an important connecting role in our historic congregation. A decision now has been made to begin publishing *Church Life* quarterly in the following four editions:

- January / February / March
- April / May / June
- July / August / September
- October / November / December

This division dovetails well with the flow of the liturgical year and the way our events tend to be organized. *Church Life* will continue to include a look back at the past months (in this case going all the way back to May) and a view forward three months (in this case the Thanksgiving, Advent, and Christmas seasons). Katelyn, as the editor of this publication, will have final say over what is included and she will leave her own unique mark on it. The weekly email, however, will take precedence since it will always have the most updated information. As we continue on into what may be yet another fall and winter with Covid, we have no real way of knowing whether the activities we advertise in *Church Life* (e.g., the Christmas Eve service) will take place in person or virtually. So please be sure and read your weekly 'Tuesday Emails'! And please be sure to welcome Katelyn Crane as our new administrative assistant! I think you will discover, as I have, that she is simply awesome!

A Letter from our Administrative Assistant

Hello FCC!

The past few months have certainly been a whirlwind, getting to know my responsibilities here at the church, as well as many of the wonderful people who call FCC home. I have never felt more welcomed, appreciated and cared about in a job, as I already do here at FCC! Thank you to each and every one of you who has gone out of your way to make this new journey a pleasant one for me.

I never imagined I would end up working as an administrative assistant at a church. I attended a few different Christian churches growing up, and it was a strong foundation for who I



would become— a thoughtful, caring, heart centered person, seeking Truth. Although church has not been a significant part of my adulthood, I have certainly grown closer to God in my years since moving out on my own.

Growing up, I didn't have a lot of guidance on what I could do with my life. By the time I had reached the point in high school where friends were applying to colleges, the thought of going for a career I'd spend every day doing for decades to come felt repulsing to me!

The one thing I did always know is that I wanted to have a family and be a mother. So I partnered up at 17 and at 19 I got pregnant for the first time but at 8 weeks had a miscarriage. The doctors told me the statistics of how normal this was, but I couldn't help look at myself and wonder why my body rejected the pregnancy. At this point I was about 20 lbs. overweight, heavier than I ever had been. I was living the typical young adult lifestyle of eating mostly junk food, drinking all the soda and sweet drinks I wanted and simply paid no attention to my general well being. Looking back, this wasn't just a "young-adult" thing like I thought, but was more about the way in which I was raised. Health was never a priority, or even a thought, until someone was in crisis mode.

Because of the miscarriage, I began to do my own research on health and was immediately inundated with information on our food system and its brokenness. I slowly incorporated changes to my diet. I cooked more, I ate less processed foods and drinks. And at 20, I became pregnant again. It was a perfect pregnancy. I rarely ever felt nauseas and I had zero complications. Xavier came into the world (10 days late!) on a beautifully dreary morning in November of 2010. Being a mother only deepened my desire to give my family the best that I could.

As Xavier began to grow out of infancy and into toddlerhood, I began to think about my larger role in the community I was a part of. What good was all this knowledge if all I did was keep it to myself? So when Xavier was two, I began seeking a way to study nutrition, so that I could empower others to educate themselves on what they put into their bodies. After talking with a few folks about a traditional dietetics/nutrition program, I knew this wasn't the route for me. I kept digging and found an accredited program at Southwest Institute of Healing Arts (S.W.I.H.A.). Shortly after staring school, some unfortunate events came to a head & I separated from my husband & eventually went through a divorce.

But this school that I had begun at the perfect time was my saving grace. I was first attracted to S.W.I.H.A for their nutrition classes, but I learned so much about Holistic Health that has shaped the person that I am so happy I have become. It was a great support in that transition time for my family.

The program I entered would bring me a degree in Mind Body Transformational Psychology, as well as certificates in Holistic Nutrition & Life Coaching. That introduction to "holistic health" changed my life.

According to **OxfordLanguages** the word holistic when referring to philosophy is "characterized by comprehension of the parts of something as intimately interconnected and explicable only by reference to the whole." and likewise when referred to in medicine is "characterized by the treatments of the whole person, taking into account mental and social factors, rather than just the symptoms of a disease."

It seems obvious to me now, that our health and well being would be determined not just by some disease state that happens **to** us, but by the many intricacies that make up our own unique human story. Our health is effected by everything— the food and drink we consume, the amount of movement our body is allowed, the things we put onto our skin, the products we use in our homes, the families we are born into and the environments that raise us, the amount of stress we deal with on a regular basis, the thoughts we think and the words we speak, the media and entertainment we inundate ourselves with, the air we breathe and the amount of sunlight we receive, etc. Every little thing.

The thought of this sometimes seems a bit daunting, but it is also the most empowering lesson I have ever acquired in this life. Human beings are incredibly powerful. Every choice we make harnesses that power in one way or another. And we live in a country where we have so much freedom of choice.

Although I am still far from a perfect example of health, I am healthier and more whole and balanced than I have ever been. Learning the power that my choices have has inspired me in many ways— to grow & prepare my own food, to spend lots of time outdoors moving my body in different ways, to pay attention to how different activities make me feel, to go to therapy, to be discerning of who I spend my time with, to focus on what nourishes myself and my family. I learned that the most important thing I could do for my community is to stay centered on what it is that brings me health and wellness. Because when I am balanced, I can be of best service to my family and then greater community.

No one's health and wellness journey will look identical, because that is just the nature of nature! And that is what humans are, nature. But I hope that I can be an example of getting curious and empowered by the impact of our own daily choices.

From the Church Buildings Reopening Committee


We will continue to offer Sunday School at 9:30 a.m. and meet in person in our sanctuary at 10:30 a.m., as we follow the guidelines of the CDC. We believe that we can safely do this because the majority of the people attending have been vaccinated. We recognize, however, that many of you prefer to join the worship celebration virtually either through Facebook Live or Zoom. We will try to provide these virtual options, internet permitting, and as long as we have volunteers to oversee the equipment.

As a measure of respect and love for each other, please observe the following guidelines established by the committee last year:

- 1. Wear a mask, regardless of vaccination status, except when observing communion. (Extra masks are available in the narthex.)
- 2. Practice social distancing.
- 3. Enter by the southeast door (the left one when facing the church front). Please pick up a prepackaged communion cup upon entering and a mask if you do not have one with you. The bulletins

also are on that table. (NOTE: if you need gluten-free communion bread, you may find some on the table immediately upon entering the sanctuary.)

- 4. Collection plates will be available at the doors leading into the narthexes at the back of the church sanctuary and also the door at the front of the sanctuary leading into the hallway.
- 5. Exit through either of the doors on the south side.



-Fellowship (as we update each other about our lives)


- -Reflect on a piece of poetry that has spiritual or ethical importance (to be emailed out earlier that day, but which need not have been read beforehand to participate)





Why Do I Give to the Church?"

I looked in my Bible Concordance for giving and tithe and found several references for each and the one I chose was **Nehemiah 10:37**

"And we made ordinances to bring the first fruits of one ground and the first fruits of all trees year by year to the house of the Lord. To bring the first born of our servants, our cattle, as it is written in the Law. And the first born of our herds and our flocks to the house of our God.to the priest who minister in the house of our God (the Levites) — and the Levites shall bring up a tenth of the tithes to the house of our God and to the rooms of the store house."

Notice this passage always states "first fruits."


So I give to the church to support the ongoing ministry whatever that may be.


A Peek Inside Rebecca Landolt's Sunday School Class














History of First Christian Church Murray, KY

First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), located on the corner of Main and North Fifth, found its origins in the Stone Campbell Restoration Movement of the early 1800s. The radical thinking of the Presbyterian ministers Thomas and Alexander Campbell in Pennsylvania and Barton Stone in Kentucky spoke to the needs of American settlers, who yearned for simplicity, unity, and freedom of thought. The original building (1844), on the corner of Maple and Sixth, was the second public building in Murray. The membership record book shows that Nathan B. Stubblefield (who invented the radio) made his confession of faith and was baptized on August 18, 1881. The first building on the present site was erected in 1868 and for 36 years (with approximately 800 members) was served by 19 ministers. The present building, dedicated in October 1905, was damaged by a fire on November 17, 1956. The Educational building served as the worship center until the fire-damaged building was restored and dedicated on March 16, 1958. In 1986, the church was listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In reference to the destructive fire in 1956, to quote Reverend J. Howard Nichols, "what seemed at the first moments tragedy, conspired to bring us to a unique celebration." The late Lyle Underwood, Elder and Board Chair, wrote that "Sunday afternoon, March 30, 1958, the new sanctuary that 'arose' from the ashes of the building was dedicated and we came together to celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the permanent establishment of this congregation."

The late Rev. Dr. David C. Roos, who helped found Need Line and established a branch of Habitat for Humanity, served the longest, continuous pastorate in the history of this congregation from 1971 to 1995. Following is his introduction to the 1958-1978 publication of the church history: "Dear Friends: The First Christian Church of Murray has a long and glorious history ... It has experienced the pain of heartache and hardship but also knows the joy of courageous effort and the nobility of sacrificial leadership. This congregation has given to this county and city many of its finest leaders throughout the years and undoubtedly will continue to do so in the future. Their commitment to the community was directly related to their deep and unswerving dedication to Christ and His Church. ... We look with pride to our past so that we might move toward the future with clearer vision and surer steps believing that the future is open-ended and hopeful."

Rev. Dr. Ruth Ragovin was welcomed on February 23, 2009. Her gifts of spirituality and leadership have continued to enhance the growth and development of the church even through these many months of the challenges created by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The available technology and commitment of members with these skills enabled worship, studies, and ministries to thrive during the time the building was closed. We pray God's forever blessings and guidance upon His church for years to come.

In the summer months our church participated in the following:

We returned our baby bottles for the **Life House** campaign on Father's Day. "Every year, as a fund-raiser for Life House Care Center, on Mother's Day we give out Baby Bottles to be filled with coins, bills, or checks, which we then ask to have returned on Father's Day. Last year the pandemic prevented us (and other churches) from doing so, leaving Life House without important funds to help women expecting babies in our community. This year we were able to continue this important ministry as people took baby bottles home with them, raising a total of **\$589.47**, considerably more money for this important organization than we anticipated. We received the following note from them:

"Thank you for your continuing to support us through all the challenges. Thank you for faithfully supporting the women & men who walk through our door with your consistent investment in this ministry. ... We appreciate your support, as do those you may never meet who need us each day.""

Many in our congregation helped at "A Night on the Town" (July 24, 2021) to raise money for HOPE Calloway to assist the homeless in Calloway County. A \$250 check was given in honor of Crystal Dillard who was a box dweller. The McAllisters gave away "Little Acts of Kindness" bags. Electric candles were sold to raise funds for HOPE Calloway, purchased by Rebecca Landolt. Helping at the table were Ann Thornton, Judy Lyle, the Hughes family, and the Gray family at different times during the evening. (See pages 25 and 26 for photos and more information on this event)

We contributed money (\$250) to **Laundry Love** for the month of July. Due to COVID, we no longer work at the laundry mat but Iwash cards are given to families through the school's resource centers. Twenty cards are loaded with \$12.50 each and distributed (10 each) to the Murray and Calloway schools. We still partner with St. John's Episcopal Church and First Presbyterian Church for Laundry Love.

Faith Journey - Tony Van Dyke

I am going to skip some of the more sordid details and begin where all thing begin, at the beginning.


I was raised and attended a Methodist church until the age of 18. I drove by it the other day and it came back to me that it was rebuilt in 1951. I remember singing lead in a quartet made up of Kay and Rosanne Gallimore, Thomas Page Alexander, and the pianist, Ann Snow. Rosanne has made music with Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, and Glen Campbell, both as a singer and as a writer. She now has a ranch down in Texas and has done well for herself.

After I graduated in 1955 from Puryear, my dad, whom I had seen only once in my life, paid for my first – and last – year at Lambuth College. I felt the call to preach and received my license in 1956. I believe I preached two sermons before going to Chicago to work. When I returned, not knowing that my father had already paid for my second year at college, a couple buddies and I enlisted in the Army. Then I began to be introduced to different systems of worship.

I have become familiar with Buddhist, the Tao, Catholic, and just about every major Protestant religion there is. I was in military intelligence and it helped to know the habits and beliefs of the people you were working with at the time.

I dated a Catholic girl in China and then met a young lady whose parents were Pentecostal missionaries and she is here today. There was a 45 year span of time before the proposal made on her 17th birthday could come to be but, as she says and I agree, we both had a lot to learn.

After we were married in Mexico, we came back to Paris, TN and began attending a Baptist church there. I always felt that I was not fit to step inside, even though I sang in the choir. There was just something missing.



Charlotte began attending a study course here in Murray. Pastor Ruth also attended and they got their heads together and set up what I refer to as a "con job." Ruth asked if I would come and sing some Sunday. I came down and sang "Where Could I Go but To the Lord?," the Elvis version.

When we left, I told Charlotte that was the first time in years I had left church feeling uplifted.

We have been here since where I found my true faith.

Faith Journey - John Roark

One of my first recollections of being in church was sitting in this sanctuary right over there, listening to my mother play the organ for a service. She was a substitute for the organist from time to time. My father did a brief stint as the custodian for the church. At the time, my father was a student at Murray State, but we moved back and forth between Murray and Hopkinsville. We attended here when in Murray and at First Christian Church in Hopkinsville when there. Finally, we moved permanently to Hopkinsville where we continued to go to church at First Christian.

It was in Hopkinsville that I was baptized and began singing in the Church Choir. I must confess that during my college years, I did not go to church very often. However, it wasn't long after graduation that I put my music degree to use in church and began directing a choir. I directed choirs for 6 churches in 3 different denominations. One of them even hired me twice!

While I confess that the original reason that I started directing church choirs was to supplement my income, I also began to pay more attention to the chosen scriptures so that the music message did not conflict with the sermon message. In order to choose the best music for a given Sunday, I needed to understand the texts for each service as well as the view of the minister and how they might treat each text. I learned from each pastor that I worked with. Somewhere along the line, I began to understand that my job as a church choir director was to enrich the service and to bring the same message as the pastor was bringing.


When Beth and I came to Murray, we decided to come here to worship. I did not want to find a church choir to direct. It wasn't that I was burned out, but it was always difficult to really worship when I was waiting for the cue for the next thing for me to direct. Since coming here again, I have

had the privilege of bringing the message a couple of times as well as preaching at a Roark family reunion. Fortunately for me, many of the thought processes that I used in picking out music as a choir director also worked in creating a sermon message.

I guess that brings my Faith Journey up to date. It will be interesting to see where it goes from here.
